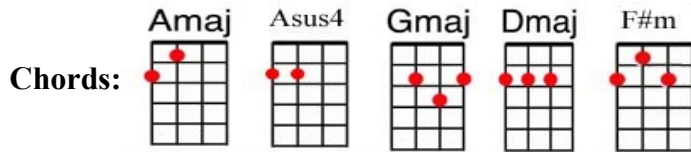


Tangled Up In Blue by Bob Dylan
